The Forum is the agency of the student body for the promotion of the general welfare and interests of the school. It is composed of two representatives, a boy and a girl, from each class, and one representative from each organization. This year Mr. Aronson acted as the adult advisor of the group, assisted by the student chairman, William Whaley.

A mock election was held in November to "elect" national, state, and local officials and to decide upon the other questions presented on the official ballots.

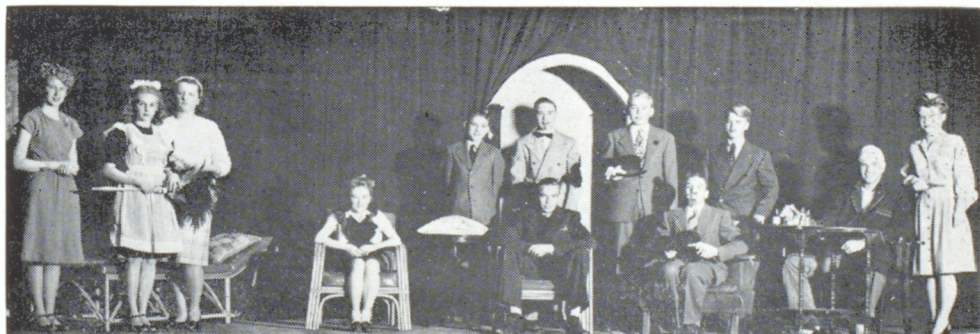

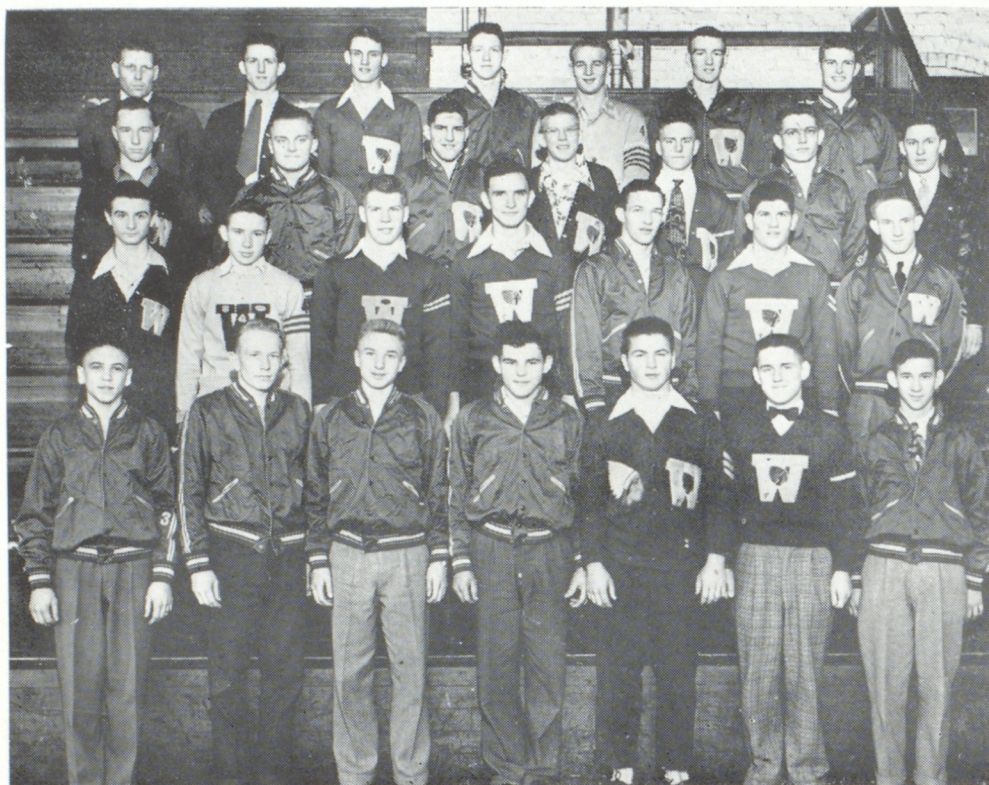

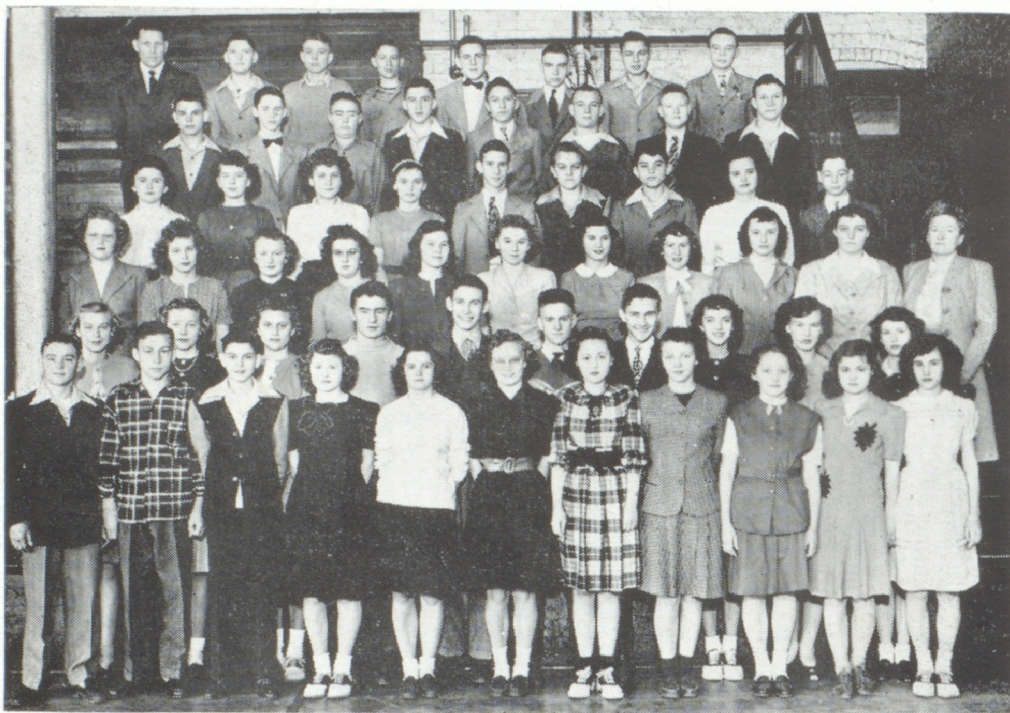
Seventy-seven lively juniors entered high school in the fall of '46.
