In September of 1943, 49 enthusiastic freshmen entered Wahoo High School. This class elected Bill Whaley, president; Charles Lanik, vice-president; Joan Hanson, secretary; Donna Cruickshank, treasurer. Miss Wedell accepted the "big sister" position of being class sponsor. The class play, "Herby and the Mumps," was presented on March 10, 1944.

These freshmen, now sophomores, settled down for the second phase of high school, this time electing the following class officers: Charles Lanik, president; Raymond Lind, vice-president; Rosemary Kavan, secretary; Donna Cruickshank, treasurer. Mr. Magnusson took honors as the class sponsor for the sophomores. "Who Murdered Who," the class play, was presented on May 10, 1945.

In September 1945, 49 juniors returned as veterans of high school life. Class officers were elected as follows: Bill Whaley, president; Dorothy Maynard, vice-president; Joan Hanson, secretary; Donna Cruickshank, treasurer. Miss Doty accepted the responsibility of sponsoring the complex activities of the year with Mr. Menke as co-sponsor. The play, "Her Step-Husband," was presented on November 29 and 30 under the direction of Mrs. Krause. The class sold apples at basketball games and swept up the cores.

The most important and concluding activity of the year for the juniors was the Junior-Senior Prom held in May. Here the juniors were honored to be the hosts to the seniors of 1946 who were soon to bid farewell to W. H. S.

The freshman year has drawn to a close and the members are looking forward to their sophomore year in high school.



From sixty to eighty boys are enrolled each year in practical arts. The purpose of this department is to give each boy some knowledge and experience in the use and care of common tools and materials. Woodworking, metalworking, painting and finishing, general electricity and care of electrical appliances, shop drawing, moulding, use of concrete mortar and plaster, and reconditioning of tools are some of the courses offered in this department. The beginners use practically no power tools the first year. After the first year each student is required to make one project involving many different phases of machine work.

During the first year of home arts, the girls study food selection, preparation and serving of breakfasts. At the end of the first semester breakfasts are served, and each girl is a cook, waitress and guest. The second semester, girls make notebooks which include samples of eighteen essential processes of sewing. Later, aprons and dresses are made.

The second year of home arts includes the study of luncheons and dinners—their preparation and serving. The girls again serve as cooks, waitresses and guests at dinners, to which a teacher is an invited guest. The second semester, clothing work includes dresses, blouses, skirts and slacks. At the end of the year, mothers are invited to a style show and tea.


The Forum, Wahoo High's intermediary for students and faculty, serves mainly as an organization for planning school functions.

Lettermen, riding in a wagon drawn by the Pep Club girls, royally led the parade of cheering high school pupils through town. At each intersection a circle was formed and yells were given.

In the spring of 1945 the Pep Club sponsored a dinner party honoring the "W" Club. The dinner was held in the Gibson Tea Room, and games were played in the high school gymnasium.


