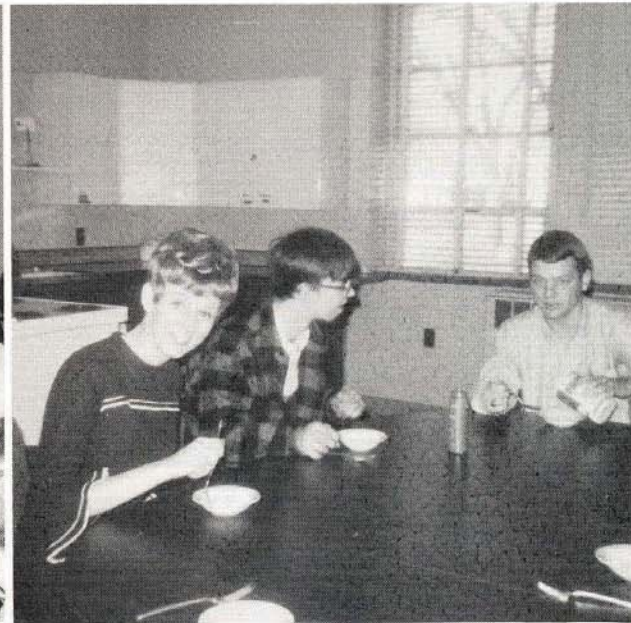

The Board is a policy making body for the school involving the expansion of school curriculum and the authorization of the school buildings.

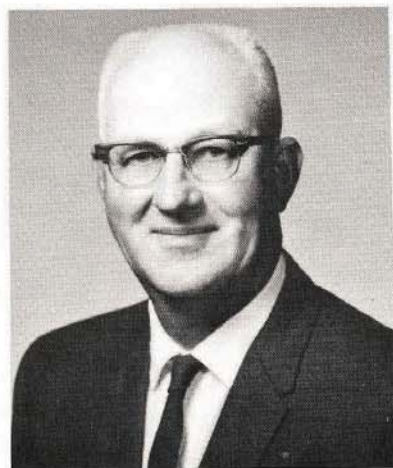

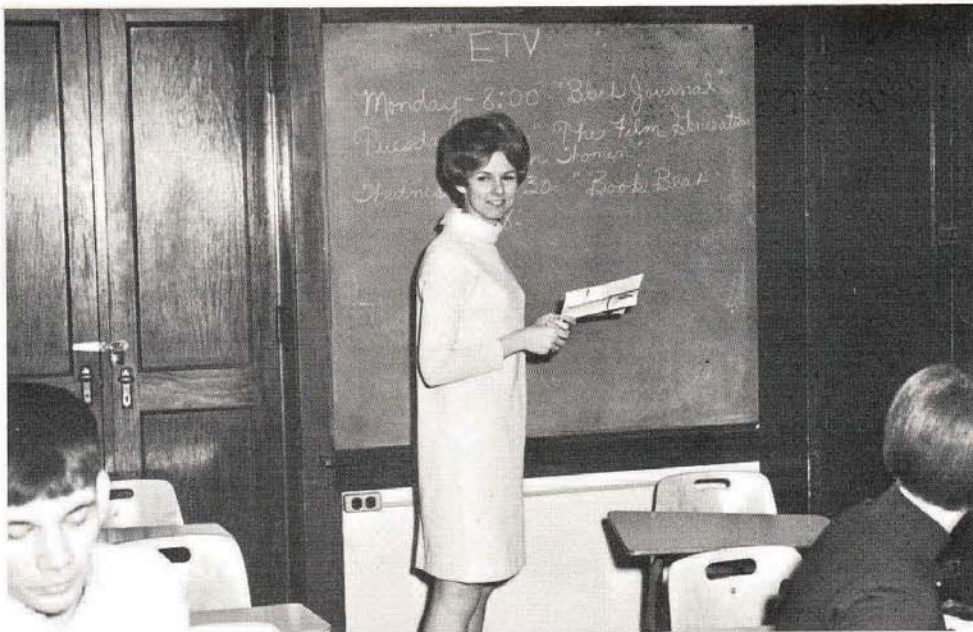
The junior and senior English teacher is Mrs. Linda McCabe. She also assists in the Speech department. She attended the University of Nebraska and has a BS degree.

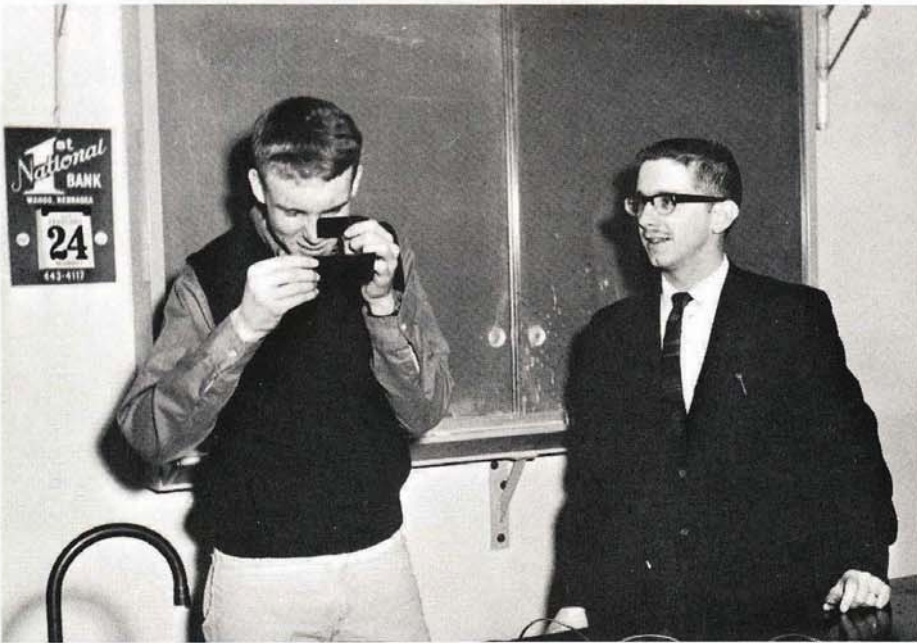

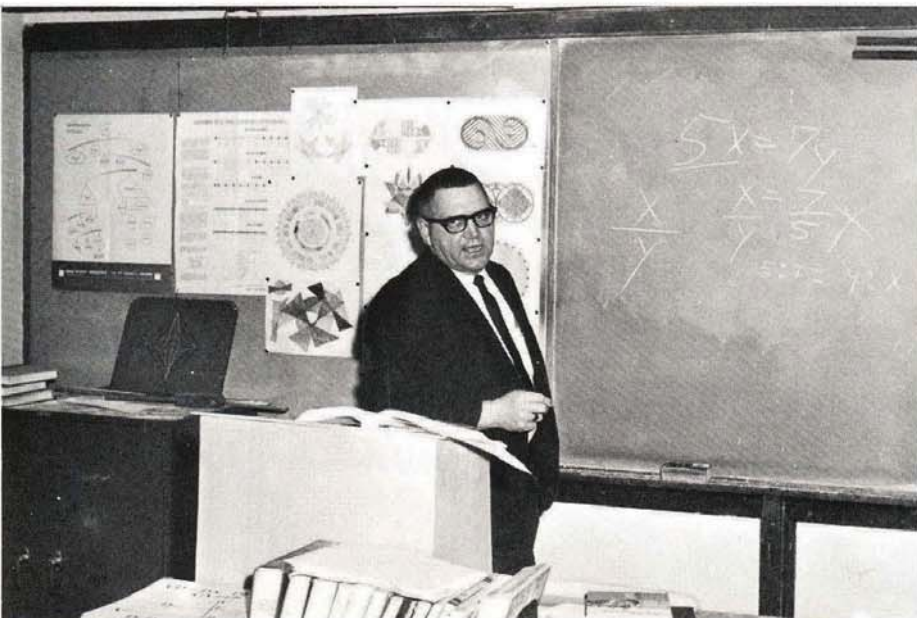

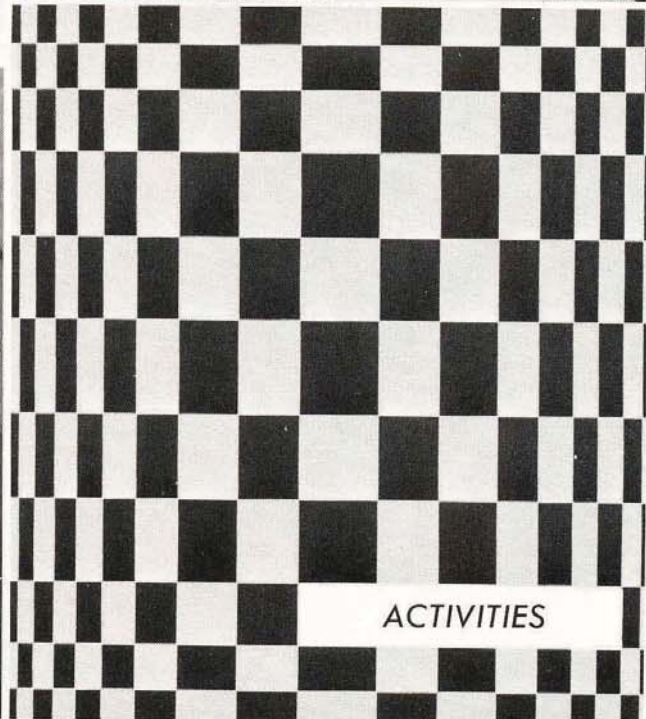

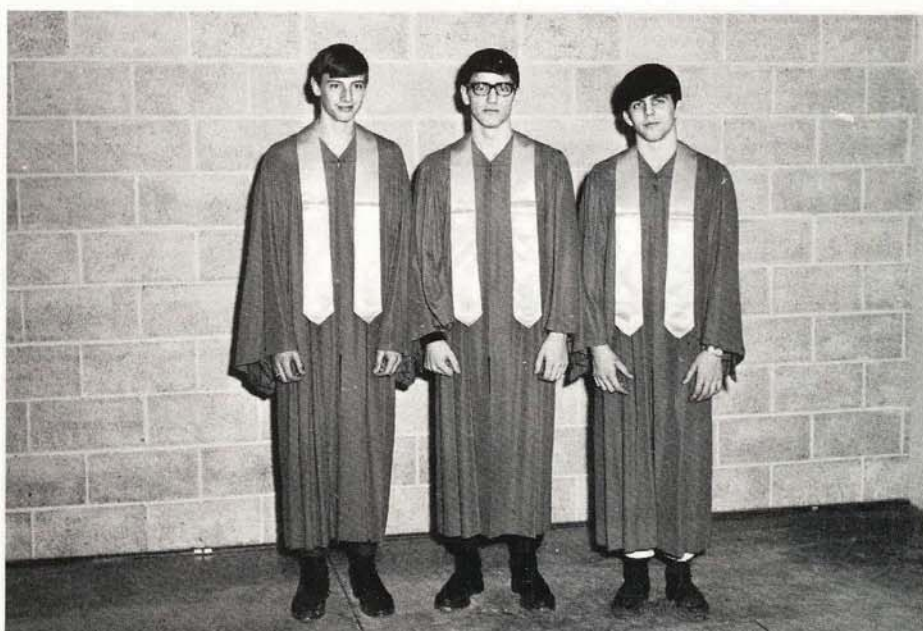

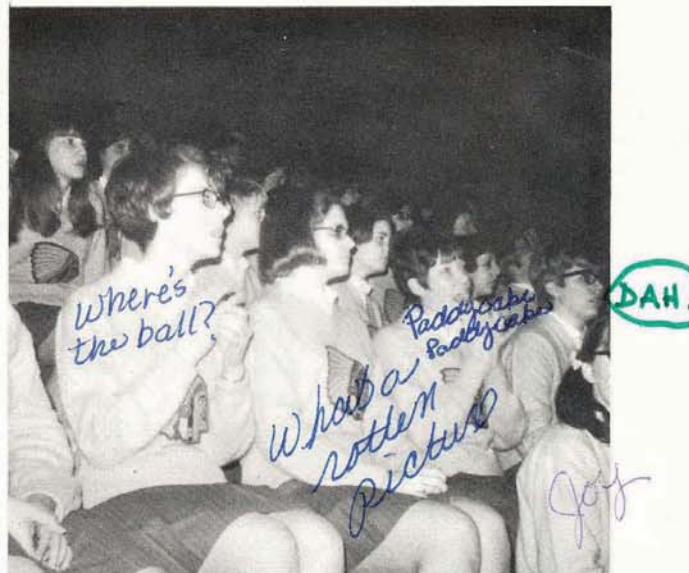


# Pep Club Has School Spirit

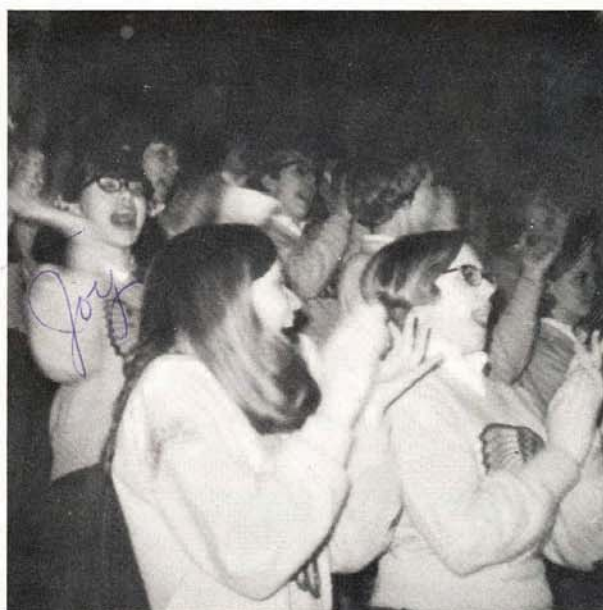
Long hours decorating the school, fixing victory juice and cakes and composing encouraging messages for lockers kept the Pep Club busy this past year.

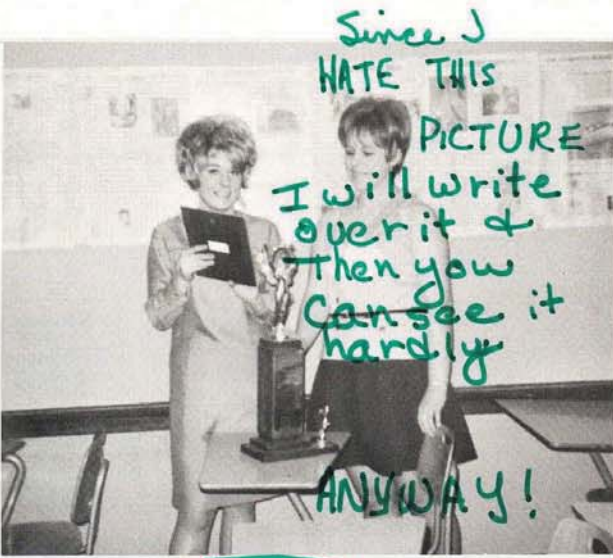




# Paper Gets Awards

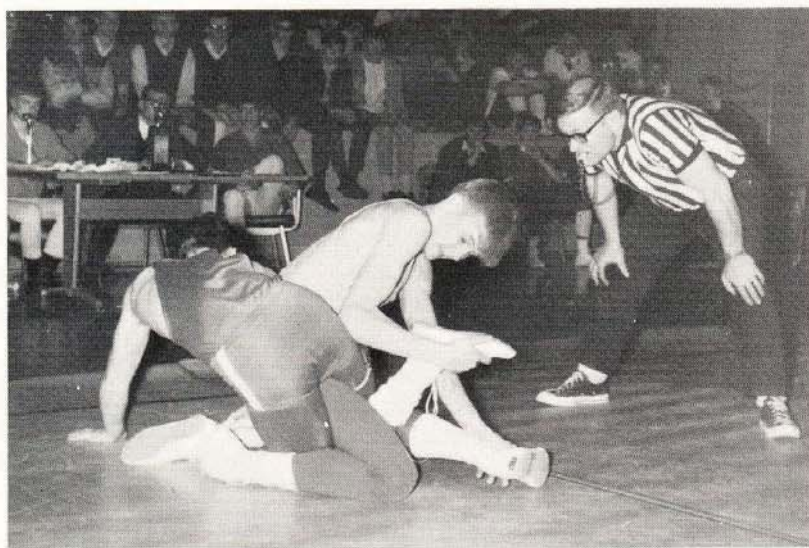

County Government Day gave 17 Juniors the opportunity to observe local government in action as they spent the day with various county officials.

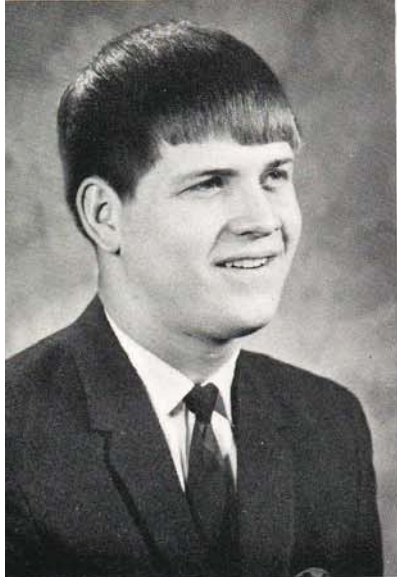
Increased school activities and responsibilities marked the year for the junior Class.
