Warriors Defeat Pierce, 38-0, to win its first-ever Class C-1 State Football Championship

On a cold, snowy November morning just before Thanksgiving, the Warrior Football team took care of business and won the school's first-ever state football championship by defeating the Pierce Bluejays, 38-0, at Memorial Stadium in Lincoln. The Warriors, led by longtime head football coach Chad Fox, went 13-0 on the season, outscoring their opponents 612-54. The Warrior defense allowed opponents an incredible average of just four points per game. Senior Luke Partridge said, "Our hard work paid off. We wanted to prove ourselves to all the doubters who didn't think we could do it." Senior Trevin Luben said, "It's everyone's dream to win a state championship, and to do it with people you grew up with makes it even better." Luben, who plans to walk-on at the University of Nebraska in the fall, set a school rushing record of 622 carries for 4,736 yards. He also had a career scoring record of 474 points and a scored a season-record of 264 points. Senior Kole Bordovsky had a season record of 161 tackles on defense. Senior quarterback Thomas Waido said, "We won this award as a team. This group of guys--many of us who have known each other our whole lives--united to achieve this goal."











Girls Basketball: Establishing Dominance on the Court






Boys Basketball: Team Blasts throug











Keeping an on ICU Repeat Offenders



Warrior student athletes depend on Athletic Trainer Rachel Hall

Whether they have a sprained ankle, bloody nose, or pulled muscle, Wahoo High School student athletes and coaches have come to depend on Athletic Trainer Rachel Hall as a knowledgeable, caring source to help them recover.

Hall, who is contracted to the Wahoo Public Schools by Saunders County Medical Center, grew up in Morse Bluff, Nebraska, and got her degree at Mankato State University in Minnesota. She got into athletic training because as an athlete in high school, she frequently was injured and did research on her injuries. "I also love to watch sports, so this is a good way to do that," Hall said.

"Every day is different," Hall said. "You just don't know what's going to happen, so I have to be prepared." Some of the craziest injuries she's worked include performing CPR on an athlete, helping a hockey player with a crushed windpipe, and helping a football player whose shin split open.

Hall, who admits to taping an athlete in 30 seconds, loves working with the students at Wahoo, and all Warrior athletes appreciate and say thank you to her for her advice, wisdom, and help.













We Interrupt the 2019-2020 Sch

News of a new virus spreading across China came out just after Christmas, but it received little notice in the United States. Reports about the deadly virus, known as the Coronavirus, or COVID-19, became more frequent as winter dragged on. Early in March, a case was reported in Fremont and schools closed there for 10 days. Wahoo High School went about its business, excited for the first round game of the Boys State Basketball Tournament. On March 11, the day before the tournament was to begin, the community was shocked to learn that all tournament games would be closed to all spectators except close family. Little by little, word of more cases spread acrosss America, and the virus, which once seemed to far way and distant, got close to home. On Sunday, March 15, Superintendent Brandon Lavaley announced that the Wahoo Public Schools would close through Friday, March 27. Learning would tinue as "enrichment activities" on Canvas until further notice. School was held on Monday, March 16, so students could get instructions about their online enrichment lessons and to clean out their lockers. It was possible that March 16 could be the last day of school for the 2019-2020 school year. The annual Close-up trip to Washington, DC, and the Prom were canceled, and spring sports--which began practices two weeks earlier--were postponed. Restaurants closed and only





offered take out or drive through service. Public gatherings were limited to 10 people or further. On March 21, Mr. Lavaley announced school was closed indefintely.




